Eagle Scout Candidate to Restore Riverbank in MacArthur Park

Lutheran North sophomore, Luke Graber, has organized a work day to restore the bank of the Clinton River at MacArthur Park in Mount Clemens this weekend.

On Saturday, August 18, and Sunday, August 19, Graber will work with his troop and members of the community to complete the project and fulfill his requirements for becoming an Eagle Scout.

Over the weekend, Graber will

remove debris and bring in 20 yards of fill-dirt, 10 yards of mulch, and more than 60 plants to restore the riverbank. The Eagle Scout candidate, a member of Troop 349 in Macomb and a Mount Clemens native, said he knew the area needed attention because he lives on the Clinton River and swam at the Macomb YMCA near the site for many years. With a new kayak launch set to open at the park this summer, he thought restoring the riverbank would be the perfect project.

"I've always liked the outdoors," Graber said. "I hope it makes the area better and attracts more people and wildlife."

Graber began planning the project back in January. In addition to getting it approved by his scoutmaster, chairman, and Boy Scout Committee, he's been consulting with Eric Diesing, a watershed ecologist at the Clinton River Watershed Council. Graber has worked hard to make sure that his

Macomb Reps Work to Impeach Bucci

State Reps. Steve Marino and Jeff Yaroch this week discussed details about a new state-level plan to remove Macomb Township Trustee Dino Bucci from office.

The legislators detailed a resolution that could start impeachment proceedings against Bucci, who was indicted by a federal grand jury nine months ago and hasn't shown up for a township board meeting since.

"Macomb and its residents deserve better than Dino Bucci," said Marino, of Harrison Township, the primary sponsor of the resolution. "We must be prepared to act at the state level in case further remedies are needed."

Marino and Yaroch have sought Bucci's removal from office for months. Bucci faces 18 counts of conspiracy, bribery, embezzlement, extortion, mail fraud and money laundering. The charges come in connection with public contracts in Macomb Township and the Macomb County Department of Public Works.

"Mr. Bucci has willfully neglected the duties of trustee at the taxpayers' expense for nine months now," said Yaroch, of Richmond, who will co-sponsor the new resolution. "If the governor will not act to remove Mr. Bucci, then it is time for the Legislature to step in to help Macomb Township move forward."

The resolution calls for a three-person Michigan House committee to investigate Bucci's conduct and make recommendations on what should be done. Those recommendations could

include articles of impeachment, which would then be voted on by the Michigan House of Representatives.

Earlier this year, Marino introduced a proposal to make sure townships have the power to compel board members to attend meetings. If those

members still refuse to show up for work, the plan makes it clear that violators would be guilty of misconduct, giving the governor clear grounds to remove the offender from office.

"Bucci isn't fit to serve the people of Macomb Township," Marino said. "He is cheating taxpayers and undermining public trust in local govern-

ment as he fails to fulfill the duties of his office. Simply put, it's time for him to go."

The resolution is expected to be formally read into the record in the House in September.

project benefits the area ecologically. He's using biodegradable coir netting and logs to help anchor the soil and is



only planting native species. He went all the way to Mason, to find a native plant nursery where he could buy shade plants found in Michigan wetlands.

Graber hopes that his conservation efforts will make him eligible for the Hornaday Award. The prize is awarded to scouts who have made significant contributions to environmental protection or awareness.

The community impact of the project can't be overlooked, either. "It's good for the revitalization of this park," said Graber's mom, Sandie. "It's kind of been neglected and not many people use it."

The community has been a part of making this project a reality for Graber. Since he received final approval in April, he's been hard at work fundraising. He started a go-fund-me campaign, sold meat sticks at his family's store in Richmond, and collected bottles. As a result of Graber's hard work and people's generosity, nearly \$2000 has been raised to buy supplies. He's received support from local businesses, too. B&W Landscape Supply in Clinton Township offered him a discount on the dirt, and the YMCA will be lending a hand to make sure the logistics of the weekend run smoothly.

Organizing the riverbank restoration has been a learning process for Graber. He said it's taught him a lot about leadership and planning. But even though it's been a big project to

tackle, Graber's had fun putting it together. His favorite part? "Talking to the people and getting people to come out," he said.

Graber has been in scouting since third grade. During that time, he's met a lot of people and had many experiences, including attending last year's National Jamboree. He has mixed feelings about his time as a boy scout coming to an end, but as he looks toward completing his project, he feels a lot of relief.

Graber's had to balance a lot between summer camp, playing football for Lutheran North, and planning his Eagle Scout project. "Sometimes, he wants to just come home, eat, and go to bed," said his mom. "But I'm like, you've got stuff to do!"

"It's relieving that I got the project done and made it all the way through," Graber said.

Graber would like to invite the community to come and lend a hand in restoring the riverbank this weekend. Those interested in helping should bring their own work gloves. A grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony for The Tutoring Center took place on Thursday, August 16. The new center is located at 21481 21 Mile Road in Macomb, on the southwest corner of 21 and Card in the 21 Shoppes Plaza.

Sarah Rappaport is the Director of the Macomb location, and said she's very excited to share The Tutoring Center with the Macomb community. She currently owns another branch of The Tutoring Center located in Birmingham.

"We have 93 children enrolled right now, so we are quite well near capacity," said Rappaport. "It's been extremely fulfilling since we opened our doors. I have met with parents before and we have been in tears together over the progress their child has made."

This center is the fifth chain located in Metro Detroit. The Tutoring

Center has a clear four-part mission for every child who studies with them. Firstly, that every child will develop stronger academic skills in reading, math, and writing. The second part of the mission is that every child will develop better concentration, focus, and attention span. The third part, that every child will gain more confidence and motivation. And lastly, that every child will develop stronger test-taking and study skills.

"We offer one-on-one instruction within the rotational approach to learning," said Rappaport. "I would say our main differentiator is our environment; there is a ton of psychology woven throughout or system, and so we do a phenomenal job at building a child's confidence. That really is a catalyst for improved performance in school and in life."

The one-on-one instruction Rappaport mentioned is offered to improve academic skills for children

from kindergarten through 12th grade. The subjects that students will hone their skills in include reading, writing, math, algebra, geometry and more. The Tutoring Center has sessions available Monday through Thursday and on Saturday mornings; children may attend two or three sessions per week.

"I think that the individualized care and attention that our families receive is probably the most exciting aspect about coming to The Tutoring Center," said Rappaport. "It's like having a personal coach."

Rappaport has been working on developing the Macomb Tutoring Center since March 2017, so she was very excited for the grand opening on Thursday.

"If I had a child who needed tutoring, this is where I would want to send them," said Rappaport.

What's in the Utica Community Schools Bond Proposal?



The Utica Community Schools Board of Education has approved placing a \$155 million bond proposal on the November 6 ballot. In a press release, officials say they aim to address safety and security, as well as technology and infrastructure improvements.

"The bond proposal will allow us to continue providing an environment that supports the academic excellence for students that our community expects and deserves," Board of Education president Gene Klida said. "The bond projects address safety and security and infrastructure priorities that directly impact our classrooms. The projects also provide our teachers the tools they need to drive learning and develop the job skills that businesses need to build our economy."

Voter approval of the bond proposal has been structured to keep the tax rate at or below the current level.

The ballot states that the bond proposal will provide for making safety and security improvements, including cameras and door-locking systems; equipping and re-equipping

school district buildings, and acquiring school buses and technology equipment;

The proposal also calls for constructing additions to and/or remodeling school district buildings; and improving and developing sites, including playgrounds, athletic fields, facilities, and structures in the school district.



"Safe and secure schools are a top priority for our community and our district," Superintendent Dr. Christine Johns (pictured above) said. "The improvements in this bond proposal are a key piece to our collaborative efforts with local law enforcement to continue to keep our schools safe places for students and staff."

Technology improvements aim to provide students and teachers the resources to support learning, includ-

ing key areas of Career and Technical Education (CTE) and the integration of skills that ensure success in college and career.

Board of Education Treasurer Dr. Robert Ross said in a press release statement that voter approval of the bond proposal has been structured to not increase the current tax rate. "Through solid fiscal planning, this bond issue has been designed to ensure we can address our facility priorities at or below our current millage level," Dr. Ross said.

Dr. Ross added that the improvements will allow the district to extend the life of current school buildings and protect the investment the community has made in its facilities.

"Area realtors are clear that the strength of Utica Community Schools protects property values and draws new families and businesses to the communities we serve," he said.

Dr. Ross noted that by law the bond revenue will be used only for capital improvements and not used for operating expenses, such as salaries or utilities. "It is important that our taxpayers know that all revenue must be used for the purposes that are specified in the bond proposal and the expenditures are independently audited," he said.

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U.S. Should Stand with Allies, Defend Human Rights

The United States has dozens of allies across the globe; therefore, it is inevitable that disputes between two countries with whom the United States is allied will arise from time to time. One such spat is currently happening between Canada and Saudi Arabia.

On August 3 the Canadian foreign ministry sent a tweet indicating that the Canadian government was “gravely concerned” about the recent arrest of women’s rights activists by the Saudi government; the tweet also urged the Saudi government to immediately release the activists. While the underlying sentiment behind the tweet was commendable, the tweet itself was a blunder—280 characters is hardly ever a good avenue for substantive foreign policy discussions.

The ill-advised tweet set off a diplomatic firestorm. Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, who has been praised by some as a reformer on issues of anti-corruption and women’s rights, has also been known to take a hardline stance when it comes to dissent and criticism. Despite lifting the

longstanding ban on women driving in Saudi Arabia and taking other pro-women stances, bin Salman has continued to arrest women’s rights activists, and it was those actions that Canada was criticizing. The Crown Prince reacted to that criticism with an extreme overreaction, recalling its ambassador to Canada, expelling the Canadian ambassador, and ordering all Saudi students studying in Canada on state sponsored scholarships—including over 1,000 medical students—to return home immediately. The Saudi government has also suspended trade and investments between the two countries.

The Canadian government has in turn stood its ground. Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced that the country will continue to engage with Saudi Arabia diplomatically but that “Canada will always be very clear on standing up for human rights.”

Despite being a major player at the international table, Canada seems to be standing alone, and that is a shame. No major Western country has taken a real position on the underlying issue; instead, most—including the United States—have avoided taking a side, arguing that the dispute is for Canada and Saudi Arabia to resolve on their own.

The reason for countries like the United States, Britain, and those in the European Union not wanting to get involved is readily apparent. Saudi Arabia is one of the largest arms pur-

chasers in the world and a strategic partner in the war on terror, and many of Canada’s allies have significant trade and economic ties to Saudi Arabia. Defending Canada could come at a steep economic price.

But this is not just about defending Canada; this is about standing up for human rights. Western countries, including the United States, have not shied away from calling out Saudi Arabia on its human rights violations in the past. More significantly, the Western world should not allow a country to take one of our allies diplomatically and economically hostage for standing up for human rights—even if the means of doing so were ill conceived. It is indisputable that Saudi Arabia is committing human rights violations, and the fact that the Saudis are our allies should not stop us from acknowledging that fact.

The United States plays a powerful and important role in world affairs. If the United States hopes to remain that “shining city on a hill” that President Reagan talked about, we need to stand with our allies to defend human rights. The Canadian government made a mistake in trying to convey diplomatic policy through Twitter, but it would be a far graver mistake for the United States and other Western countries to sit on the sidelines and not defend the substance of Canada’s criticism of the Saudi government.

Attempted Murder Suspect Held on \$5 Million Bond



inside the home. They did discover a controlled substance, a human growth hormone called Jintropin. In addition, Bashi’s vehicle was located near the scene.

Bashi has been charged with one count of Assault With Intent to Murder, torture, and one count of delivering/manufacturing a controlled substance. He was originally given a bond of \$750,000, but was later increased to \$5 million.

Bashi was back in court on August 14 to attempt to maintain his \$750,000 bond. 42nd District Magistrate Jennifer Andary presided over the bond hearing. Bashi’s defense attorney, Vince Manzella, argued that Bashi’s bond was unduly set.

Prosecutors pointed out that the alleged crimes Bashi is said to have



When they arrived at the scene, they found a woman lying on the porch, bleeding from a number of puncture wounds on her head and the right side of her body. The victim was then taken to the hospital for treatment. Currently, she is in stable condition.

The man who had reportedly been seen leaving the residence earlier, was located walking down a street close by. Paul Bashi, 35, was found with blood on him and taken into custody. He has been placed in Macomb County Jail.

Bashi and the woman were dating, and both lived in the Washington Township residence. Deputies were not able to find anyone else present

done are cruel, and that he is a danger to the public. It was further noted that this wasn’t Bashi’s first time assaulting someone, and it’s not his first time being charged with assaulting his girlfriend. Bashi was also involved in multiple crimes in the past, including a multi-million dollar fraud case that he was prosecuted for in the federal system.

After hearing both sides, Judge Andary deemed the \$5 million bond to be appropriate. The Judge then set the dates for a probable cause conference and meeting. The probable cause conference is set for September 4, and a probable cause hearing is set for September 11.

Exercises to Help Seniors Maintain Their Balance

Balance exercises are an important factor in fall prevention. Every year, more than one-third of people 65 or older suffer from fall-related injuries. Some of these injuries, like a hip fracture, can have a serious impact on an elderly person's life.

Falling could limit the person's activities and make it challenging for them to live independently. Proper balance exercises paired with certain strength exercises can be great at helping prevent falls by improving the body's ability to control and maintain position. Most balance exercises don't require you to go to the gym, let alone leave your house.

Improve your balance and lower body strength by standing on one foot, walking heel to toe, and doing a balance walk. You can also try back leg raises and side leg raises.

Standing on One Foot

- Stand on one foot behind a sturdy chair, grip for balance
- Hold for 10 seconds
- Repeat 10 times on each leg

Walking Heel to Toe

- Position the heel of one foot in front of toes of other foot. Your heel and toes should be touching or almost touching
- Select a spot ahead of you, focusing on it to keep you steady as you walk
- Step forward. Place your heel just in front of your other foot
- Repeat for 20 steps



Balance Walk

- Raise your arms to your sides at shoulder height
- Select a spot ahead of you, and remain focused on it to keep you steady
- Walk in a B-line with one foot ahead of the other
- As you walk, lift your back leg and hold for one second
- Alternate legs and repeat for 20 steps

Side Leg Raises

- Stand behind a sturdy chair, grip for balance. Slowly breathe in
- Breathe out while slowly lifting one leg to the side. Straighten your back and point your toes forward. Slightly bend the leg you are standing on
- Remain in this position and count to one

- Inhale and slowly lower your leg
- Repeat 10 to 15 times on each leg

Back Leg Raises

- Stand behind a sturdy chair, grip for balance. Slowly breathe in
- Breathe out while slowly lifting one leg back. Don't bend your knee or point your toes. You should not lean forward
- Hold this stance for one second
- Breathe in while slowly lowering your leg
- Repeat 10 to 15 times on each leg

Performing these exercises on a daily basis will help older people maintain balance into their golden years. Consult with your doctor to discover if these exercises are a good fit for you.
