Arts, Beats & Eats a Labor Day Weekend Tradition

The 21st Annual Ford Arts, Beats & Eats Festival presented by Soaring Eagle Casino & Resort returns to downtown Royal Oak on Labor Day weekend – Friday, August 31 through Monday, September 3. The festival will feature top musical acts, a Juried Fine Arts Shows, and more than 50 restaurants and caterers.

Live music at this year's festival will feature more than 200 bands and musical acts on nine performance stages. The Juried Fine Art Show will spotlight many talented artists from across the U.S., Canada, and Mexico. This year's festival patrons will have the opportunity to peruse original works of art and purchase their favorite at more than 130 artist booth spaces. The art show will have participating artists vying for cash awards totaling \$7,500. The show will feature art in a variety of mediums, including ceramics, digital art, drawing, fabric/fiber/leather, glass, graphics/printmaking, jewelry, metal, mixed media 2D, mixed media 3D, painting, photography, sculpture, and wood.

The festival has teamed up with Michigan-based Imperial Beverage to make their popular craft brews the official beer at the festival this Labor Day weekend and in the coming years. A total of 19 beverage locations, including 14 for craft beer on tap and five for canned craft beer, will feature beer from Short's Brewing Company, Lagunitas Brewing Company and Old Nation Brewing, among other fine craft beer selections.

High School Looks to Bolster Career Academies

Over the past two years, the Macomb County Department of Planning & Economic Development (MCPED) has been working with partners to explore and create a foundation for implementing college and career academies at Romeo High School with support from the Ford Next Generation Learning (NGL) network. The goal is to bolster academies that emphasize career exploration, experiential learning, and college readiness rather than perfecting the art of standardized test taking. This will be the first designated district in the state of Michigan.

The department sees this effort as a way to prepare the next generation to meet workforce demands. This transformation is currently in the planning phase, and implementation is scheduled for the 2019 school year.

MCPED serves as the community convening organization. Some of their responsibilities include supporting successful government, academic and business collaboration; building credibility in the community and gaining support; and focusing on business and community development.

Over 50 stakeholders make up the

program's steering committee. The department helps advise this committee about current industry trends and in-demand jobs and promotes the county's 10 targeted industries to the community.

The steering committee is now examining these career pathway options and will help determine the top career academies best suited to offer in the greater Romeo and Washington community.

While core studies will still be

taught in the classroom, they will be incorporated into the larger career pathways. For example, a student in the automotive academy would learn the futuristic technologies of autonomous vehicles through studying a blend of information technology, robotics, computer science and engineering.

Local businesses are also a part of the plan. They offer externships to the high school teachers, enabling them to spend time at the business so they can better understand the industry and teach it to students. Industry

experts are also welcomed to teach in the classroom, working hand in hand with teachers.

The ultimate goal is to build a model for other schools to replicate, with eventually every district in Macomb County offering some form of college and career academy.


New Transfer Agreement Reached Between Oakland University and Macomb Community College

Oakland University, along with partner schools Oakland Community College and Macomb Community College, has signed agreements that include helping transition qualified students from OCC and Macomb to OU in pursuit of School of Business Administration bachelor's degrees.

The agreements are effective through July 31, 2021 and subject to review for continuation after the initial three years.

Oakland University now allows a maximum number of 82 transfer credits from partner schools as part of this new articulation that can go towards a bachelor's degree. That number is up from the limit of 64 credits generally accepted for business degrees and should encourage students to complete their associate degree while saving on tuition costs as they prepare to transfer to OU in pursuit of their bachelor's degree.

"Collaboration among colleges and universities amplifies the strengths of each institution while leveraging resources and impact for our students and communities," said Kevin Chandler, Dean, University Relations, Macomb

Community College. "Streamlining the path from associate to bachelor's degree in business supports degree completion, positions our students for in-demand career opportunities, develops vital talent to sustain and grow local business and industry, and contributes to regional economic prosperity."

These articulations focus on business-related majors as students seek

bachelor's degrees in accounting, finance, business economics, general management, human resources management, marketing, operations management and management information systems. However, Aubry added that the schools will work on expanding articulation agreements to include other majors in the future.

SMART Millage Recount Ends, Macomb Bus Service to Continue

The SMART millage recount appears to be over in Macomb, and SMART services will continue to operate throughout the county.

According to a SMART press release, the recount request has been withdrawn and appears to be over. SMART is now waiting for the Macomb County Board of Canvassers to officially close the process. The original

certified vote count will stand.

"We are thrilled to be able to get back to concentrating on doing what we do best, which is getting 70 percent of SMART riders to work and getting people with special needs and those who are unable to afford a car to the places they need to go," said John C. Hertel, General Manager of SMART. "Now that this is over, we are going to

continue to build on the successful service that has resulted in an 11 percent increase in ridership. Also, as always, we not only look forward to our collaboration with Macomb, Oakland and Wayne Counties, but also our renewed and promising coordination efforts with the City of Detroit."

Macomb Township Couple Found Shot in Home

A residence on Mackenzie Dr. in Macomb Township was the scene of a crime on Tuesday night. Detectives of the Macomb County Sheriff's Office discovered an elderly couple who had

been shot. The woman was fatally shot, and the man was inflicted with a gunshot wound to the head.

According to a news release, a Florida man contacted Macomb County authorities requesting a welfare check. He told them that his father was slurring his words during a phone call. Macomb County dispatch also received a call from the father's home.

Deputies had to force their way into the home when there was no answer. The elderly woman was found in the master bedroom. She was dead from multiple gunshot wounds to her head, leg, and hand.

An elderly man was discovered in the bathroom of the bedroom, with a gunshot wound to the head. A handgun was also found in the bedroom.

The man is currently recovering at a hospital. The couple are the only people who occupy the home. There was also no signs of forced entry, or stolen items. Investigations into this are ongoing.

Space Force and the Flaws with the Outer Space Treaty

Just over 50 years ago, the Outer Space Treaty—the document that forms the basis of international space law—entered into force. Most developed countries ratified the treaty prior to its effective date or have since done so. No country having yet landed a man on the Moon, the treaty provided an adequate legal framework for the years to come. The basic purpose of the treaty was to promote peace in space and keep it free for all nations to explore: nations may not place weapons of mass destruction in space or claim sovereignty over space or celestial bodies, celestial bodies must be used for peaceful purposes, and nations are responsible for activities carried out by themselves or subjects and are responsible for any damages caused.

Fast-forward 50 years, and the treaty is not nearly as adequate. No longer are we living in an era where governments are the sole driving force behind space exploration; the private sector is playing an increasing role—perhaps even a dominant role in some aspects of the industry—and international space law is woefully inadequate for what lies ahead.

Although the Outer Space Treaty prohibits nations from claiming sovereignty over the Moon or other celestial bodies, the treaty is silent as to whether private entities are permitted to mine or otherwise remove natural resources. Although the treaty prohibits nations from laying claim to celestial bodies, it did not vest any authority with jurisdiction over space—most significantly, the Moon. The international community attempted to remedy this in the 1970s and 1980s with the Moon Treaty, which would have vested the international community as a whole with jurisdiction; however, only a handful of countries ratified the treaty—none of which have major space programs.

The speed at which the private space industry is outpacing the relevance of the Outer Space Treaty has already caused some problems. One of the provisions of the treaty requires that nongovernmental entities be authorized and supervised by their government. While the U.S. government has agencies that oversee and regulate launches and satellites, no such regulatory scheme exists for landing on the Moon. Moon Express, a small private company with a goal of mining natural resources from the Moon, had to come up with a one-time regulatory patch in order to get approval to put a robotic lander on the Moon. With additional private companies wanting to either gather resources from the Moon or use it as a launch pad to Mars, the lack of an existing regulatory framework is going to increasingly serve as a

roadblock to the private space industry.

Although the private sector has played an increasingly important role in space exploration, President Trump's proposal to develop a Space Force highlights an additional hole in the treaty. Although the treaty prohibits nations from utilizing space for the placement of weapons of mass destruction, it is completely silent on the subject of conventional weapons. If the U.S. proceeds with establishing a military branch dedicated to outer space, it will certainly not be the only nation to do so.

The nature of space exploration, travel, and industry has changed significantly over the past 50 years, and future changes are likely to be even more drastic. With the private sector playing an increasing role, the international community needs to have a discussion about what private industry should and should not be able to do—especially when it comes to harvesting natural resources. With the increasing chance of militarization of space, the international community also needs to lay some ground rules. Finally, because the private sector is shaping up to play such an important role, the federal government needs to draft a regulatory scheme that promotes expansion of the industry while still protecting the interests of the nation and world as a whole. The Outer Space Treaty was a revolutionary document, but the need to expand the fundamentals of space law is long overdue.
