## Traffic study in Utica starts Monday

The City of Utica will be conducting a traffic adjustment for a trial period which takes place beginning Monday, October 21.

Southbound Cass Ave. will be closed at Auburn Road with no access to Hall Road. Drivers will be able to turn east to Van Dyke or west toward downtown at Auburn Road.

Northbound Cass Ave. will be accessible from Hall Road as usual.

Southbound Van Dyke will have two right-turn lanes at Hall Road. The light at WB Hall Road and Cass Ave. will be eliminated which will allow SB Van Dyke traffic to continue WB on Hall Road unencumbered after making the turn.

Consider alternate travel if this adjustment impacts your commute.

Van Dyke will be the best option for southbound travel during the morning commute.

## UCS grad comes home to inspire next generation

Utica Community Schools graduate Jacob Little made a big impact recently when he came home to share the fruits of a 20-year dream with students.

Little, who graduated in 2001 from Henry Ford II, is releasing his first album, and he let his hometown crowd have a preview of a 50-minute performance for Eisenhower High School students.

"The music was absolutely

gorgeous," said senior Kaylie Kilroy. "The lyrics are relatable and reminded me to remember the good and let go of the bad. I can't wait till they make it big."

## 'Raise the age' bills head to Governor's desk

Legislation designed to end the policy requiring all 17-year-olds to be treated as adults in Michigan's criminal justice system is on its way to the governor's desk.

State Rep. Doug Wozniak, a sponsor of the bill, said Michigan is one of just four states still requiring all 17-year-olds to be prosecuted as adults – even those who commit the most minor offenses. He said eliminating this harmful and ineffective practice will help rehabilitate young offenders and reduce the likelihood of them breaking the law again in the future.

"Taking 17-year-olds with non-violent records and putting them into prison with adults is not the right approach. It's harmful to young people, expensive for taxpayers and does absolutely nothing to make our communities safer," said Wozniak, of Shelby Township. "With our reforms, prosecutors and judges will be able to focus on rehabilitating troubled teens and setting them up for future success."

Including 17-year-olds in the juvenile system has been shown to reduce reoffending by 34 percent, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

The plan would raise the age at which individuals are

## Bill to 'Raise the age' passes state legislature, heads to Governor's desk for approval

considered adults for the purposes of prosecuting and adjudicating criminal offenses, allowing 17-year-olds to be treated as minors in most circumstances beginning Oct. 1, 2021. Prosecutors will continue to have discretion, allowing them to waive minors who commit violent crimes into the adult system when appropriate.

**The measure also includes** a funding plan to ensure local communities do not incur any additional costs associated with keeping 17-year-old offenders in the juvenile system, which is

administered at the local level.

**"This is a momentous day** for our state," said Sen. Peter J. Lucido, R-Shelby Township, who is an attorney and former probation officer. "After months of hard work and public input, today the Legislature acted to improve our criminal justice system.

"This long-overdue reform will ensure youth who are charged with criminal acts will, in most cases, be treated as the children they are. While they will still be held accountable for their actions, they also will have the opportunity to learn from their mistakes and have a better chance

of becoming productive members of society."

**If signed,** Michigan will join most other states in prosecuting 17-year-olds as youths. Statistics show that states that have enacted similar raise-the-age laws have experienced a significant decrease in juvenile court referrals and recidivism.

"I appreciate the broad support from my colleagues on both sides of the aisle and look forward to our Raise the Age plan becoming law soon," Lucido said.

**The bills now go to the governor for signature.**

## Fatal traffic crash near Stony Creek Park

On Monday, October 14 at 10:55 a.m. the Shelby Twp. Police and Fire Departments were dispatched to 26 Mile & Main Park Drive on an injury accident.

Initial investigation revealed that a Jeep Grand Cherokee was WB on 26 Mile, and went into the turn around to enter Stony Creek Metro Park. As the Jeep was crossing the EB lanes of 26 Mile, it collided with a Dodge Ram, which was traveling EB on 26 Mile.

**The driver of the Jeep** is an 84-year-old resident of Shelby Township. He was transported to a local hospital and died a short time after the crash. The passenger of the Jeep, also an 84-year-old Shelby Township resident, was transported to a local hospital with critical injuries.

**The driver of the Dodge Ram** is a 26-year-old resident of Armada. He was also transported to a local hospital with non-life threatening injuries.





## Crypts, Coffins, and Cemeteries: The Story of Detroit's Notables and Frauds

On Monday, October 21, Step On Bus Tours is offering a unique historical excursion featuring the final journey of Detroit's rascals, ruffians, and reprobates – plus some heroes thrown in. The tour will tell the stories that celebrate their lives and after-lives.

On tours of metro-Detroit's final resting places, Step On Bus Tours travelers will find out if the dead are really buried only lying down (or maybe a few are standing up). There will be tales of cowboys, movie stars and madams – the gangsters and hoodlums who sneaked booze over from Canada during Prohibition – and how some of them went straight after repeal. There will be tales of vast fortunes being made, honestly and otherwise.

**It's a fact** – historically, bodies are scattered all over Detroit – under the streets, expressways and auto plants even before the automobile was introduced. And it's all true! All information has been checked out at the Detroit Public Library's Burton Historical Collection including the information about the Fox Native American tribe, where the crooks enjoy their final rest, and where Detroit celebs are buried.

"Bodies are hidden throughout the area around Fort Pontchartrain at Woodward and Griswold and also at Woodward and Larned. Facts about the French when the British arrived around 1810 tell us even more. We'll even hear about

the Protestant cemetery they built and how graves were regularly disturbed during construction," said Rose Szwed, Step On Bus Tours Guide and Owner.

**Schedule of the day** includes a tour of the 100-year-old Detroit Cole Funeral Home, founded in 1919. It may be the oldest, family-owned and operated funeral homes in the city of Detroit in Michigan. At 10:30, guests will learn about Mortuary Science. Tourgoers will see artifacts, how the way people memorialize the dead has changed throughout history, as well as a social and religious change. Talking about death may not be easy, but learning about the process both in terms of the science and the religious aspects surrounding the end of life is fascinating through this well-organized museum.

**At 11:30 a.m.**, it's lunch at a Coney Island en route. At 12:45 p.m., a wildcard stop will be a walk in a forgotten cemetery that is kept up by volunteers.

Because buses are no longer allowed on some of the grounds, there will be a drive around the outskirts of Elmwood Cemetery with a full commentary of notables, a battle, landscape, and the importance of trees and wildlife. Also included will be the Lafayette Street Cemetery, established by the Temple Beth El in 1850, Michigan's oldest Jewish cemetery.

**Then it's onto a visit** at St. Clement's cemetery, formally

established in 1871 although burials took place in that spot in the early 1850s and probably were unmarked, according to Szwed. The first known burial in the cemetery took place in 1854.

**Many old-timers** bought their lots before the turn of the century, but the cemetery was closed to burials in the 1930s. Up until 1951, the cemetery had over a period of years grown into a state of neglect. It had assumed the appearance of a forlorn jungle, with weeds, dead trees and wild vegetation creating this impression.

At 3 p.m. tourgoers will visit small cemetery seeped in history and mystery including the veterans of the "Toledo War" and a bevy of notables. Hear about plots of renowned animals, pets, military and police, and their owners.

**Mum's the word** on locations because the guide may have to pinch hit if one of the locations has 'an appointment.' And, besides knowing where the bodies are buried, guides also have a list of restroom stops.

The cost for the tour is \$68 per person. Departure locations are at parking lots of the Walmart at M-59 and Mound Road in Sterling Heights and Lowe's at 12 Mile and John R in Madison Heights.

## The Keto diet as a vegetarian

**Use healthy oils.** Just because a Keto diet likely includes more fat, that doesn't mean that you should give yourself liberty to consume large quantities of just any type of fat. When possible, choose beneficial olive oil and grapeseed oil when cooking or preparing salad dressings and sauces.




